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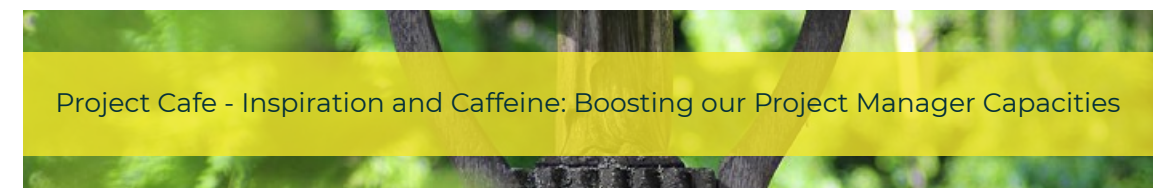
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EDITORIAL

To varying degrees, they mobilize NGOs, States and action organizations like ours. The need to strengthen our field of action is more urgent than ever in view of the devastating crises marking world news. What can be offered if it is not frameworks of solidarity free from the borders and thinking of the common challenges from the perspectives and buffers of the socio-political ethnic or cultural diversities.

Our efforts during 2019, in line with continuity, focused on advocacy and the promotion of the achievements of previous years, in particular by developing strategies and projects responding to the need for sustainability and compliance with the signs of time. Particularly in the context of the implementation of the SDGs, we have initiated actions relating to peace, water and sanitation as well as the central question of ecology.

This year was also a time of preparation for the transition of teams in the international office. The new international team was elected at the end of the statutory session of the World Assembly held in the summer of 2019. We will devote a particular range to it in this report.

Peace training in West Africa

Lomé, January 21 to 25, 2019

MIEC Pax Romana, supported by UNESCO's participation program, organized a regional training workshop from January 21 to 25, 2019 under the theme "Gender and responsible citizenship in juvenile circles for peace in West Africa." This workshop aimed to contribute to the involvement of young people in the creation of a climate of lasting peace in West Africa while promoting the gender approach in all the processes that contribute to it. 30 leaders of youth associations, coming from 9 countries of West Africa, actively took part in capacity building taking place at the reception center of the Cannociennes Sisters in Agoè in Togo.

The regional context which has aroused interest in the subject of training is marked by political and social uncertainties from which confrontations constantly arise between communities and between individuals. It was then a question of providing young people (mainly girls) with the knowledge and skills necessary to not only better understand the dynamics, but also and above all to have the capacities necessary to offer responses adapted to the challenges of their environments.

The training was based on international frameworks for promoting peace and inclusive dynamics in the struggle for peace, in particular: United Nations Security Council Resolution 2250 and 1325 and SDG 16. These provisions made it possible to "analyze the relevance of the need for the active and pronounced participation of young people and women in decision-making and action processes for the promotion of peace. It was also an opportunity to analyze national policies contributing to the more significant involvement of women and young people in the processes aimed at building peaceful and peaceful environments.

To provide a variety of perspectives on the subjects covered, the organization team mobilized trainers from various fields. The workshop was,

therefore, led by a team made up of researchers (sociologists and political scientists), magistrate and NGO actors involved in peace issues. This multi-domain expertise of the trainers was crucial to meet the expectations of the participants.

Beyond the competence of the trainers, the methodology and the overall dynamics of the workshop allowed the participants to benefit greatly. Indeed, the multicultural and interactive framework that was created during the workshop resulted in sharing of experiences and realities from which it was possible to see the diversity of situations that youth associations can face and the solutions -types that can be explored. The activities on offer are not limited to lectures. The debates, experience sharing sessions and practical exercises made it possible to go over several questions coming from the participants, with regard to the challenges they encountered in the field.

The final evaluation of the training workshop noted the value of this capacity building and the need to expand it to produce more impact. In addition, several activities were organized following this training as a local resonance of it. The book which should be published following this workshop will largely take into account the experiences shared during these days.





The annual meeting of the interagency network for youth development (IANYD) was held in Paris from March 11 to 13, 2019 in UNESCO premises. This meeting had this time the particularity of involving representatives of international youth platforms (UN MGCY and ICMYO) and organizations specifically engaged on certain subjects such as UNOY (on peace and security issues) and the commonwealth Youth Council (as an observer at the UN General Assembly).

MIEC Pax Romana, as a member of ICMYO and of the great United Nations group for children and youth (UNMGCY) was represented by its International President Edouard Karoue.

The discussions focused largely on the implementation of the 2030 youth strategy and the mechanisms for greater representation of young people in the process of its implementation. To discuss the 2030 strategy, a virtual exchange was launched with the SG's envoy for young people.

Specific laboratories were also proposed to deepen the discussions, in particular:

Young people and decent work;

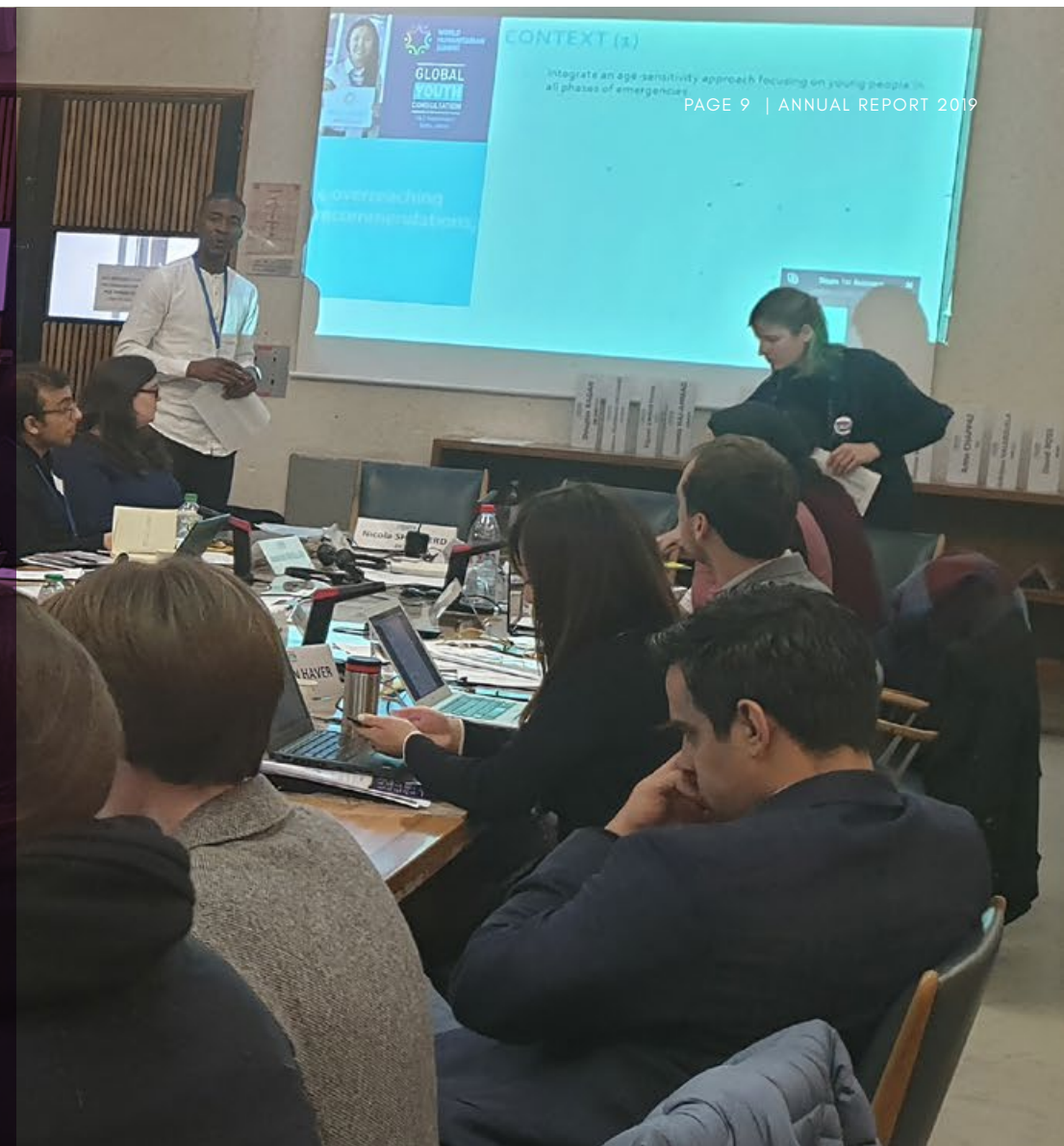
Youth peace and security;

Global action on the education of young people on Human Rights.

During this meeting, the president of MIEC Pax Romana was given the

opportunity to present the youth pact signed in Istanbul at the world humanitarian summit. In fact, as a signatory organization to this pact, MIEC Pax Romana took part in monitoring the implementation of this pact in collaboration with agencies, funds and programs of the United Nations. It was therefore a question for the president to give an overview of the content of this pact, its functioning, the achievements made in its framework and the challenges for the future.

It was also an opportunity to discuss with the United Nations agencies the possibilities for a better implementation of the contract which involves more than 40 organizations / agencies / governments, etc.

The meeting also created

the conditions for discussions on improving the network of United Nations agencies for the development of young people. Many partnerships and collaboration have been established on current or future projects.

These exchanges are expected to contribute to the implementation of the 2030 youth strategy.





Each year, the International Movements of Catholic Action meet to discuss common issues. This year's meeting was held in Brussels, at JOCI headquarters, with the participation of MIEC Pax Romana, MIIC, JOCI, CIJOC, MIJARC and JECL.

It was a question of identifying at the level of each participating movement:

1. The biggest challenges encountered;
2. The greatest work done;
3. Identification of action points

At the start of the meeting, a brainstorming session was held to discuss the challenges shared globally with the church and in the communities of action.

The discussions then focused on the activities recently carried out as well as the commonalities between the participating organizations in terms of challenges encountered and restructuring efforts. More specifically, the challenge of contact with the leaders and actors at the grassroots was taken up as challenges shared

by all the other movements. The difficulties linked to the mobilization of funds for specific activities were also underlined.

The meeting concluded on future initiatives and possibilities for collaboration for more significant impacts.



Monitoring site in Sénégal

July 15 to 23, 2019

In order to inquire about the state of the movement and to meet certain resource people as part of a project under preparation, the international president paid a visit to Dakar (Senegal) from July 15 to 23, 2019. The objective was not only to meet the leaders of the movement in the locality, but also to have interviews with resource persons within the framework of a project being planned.

From the first days, the president met with the teacher-researchers of the Cheikh Anta Diop University of Dakar (UCAD) who are involved in the restoration of the desert ecosystem as part of the Great Green Wall project. The objective of these meetings was to have the necessary information and the specific issues related to the possible implementation of a project that would involve the youth of the movement in restoring the biodiversity of the Sahara Desert.

The first meeting took place with the Director of the Institute of Environmental Sciences (ISE), Professor Bienvenu Sambou, involved for several years in the multidisciplinary approach to the challenges linked to desertification. After having presented the areas of interest to the Institute, the professor has elucidated the approaches which it is important to favor when it is a scientific approach which

aims to provide lasting solutions to the desert. In this context and to the advantage of the partnership proposed by IMCS, several options were observed which could serve as a point of reference for launching a project whose interest would be to accelerate the implementation of the ambitious project of the Great Green Wall.

The second meeting was with Professor Aliou Guissé, research coordinator at the Great Green Wall. This meeting allowed us to get to the bottom of the great challenges that the Great Green Wall project is facing at the African level. It was an opportunity to assess the challenges of the measures and the needs to be satisfied for the success of this initiative. At the end of the meeting, the possibilities of collaboration with IMCS Pax Romana within the framework of its project were clarified and noted as a starting point.

These formal meetings were accompanied by telephone exchanges and informal sharing with young people from the movement and other young people from Dakar on the issue of the Great Green Wall. These exchanges enabled the president to gather a quantity of information which will be paid to the commission working on the imminent implementation of the project called "Youth Alliance for

the Great Green Wall"

In addition to these meetings concerning the specific project, the international president visited the university chaplaincy and had the opportunity to exchange views with those responsible for university pastoral care. An afternoon of training for the coordination team allowed the president to address the fundamental questions related to the challenges of youth participation in the search for solutions to development problems. He insisted on everyone's responsibility in the continuous deepening of leadership knowledge and other documents that underpin IMCS Pax Romana's action around the world.

To crown his visit, the president was treated to a program on Radio Espérance to discuss for 1 hour the issues of the laity, specifically young academics. It was also an opportunity for the president to introduce IMCS Pax Romana to radio listeners.



World Assembly 2019

Lusaka (Zambia), July 27 to August 9, 2019

As a movement working on the development of transformational youth leadership by reviving critical thinking, the World Assembly (AM) of the international movement of Catholic students (MIEC Pax Romana) of 2019 was held in Lusaka (Zambia) from July 27 to August 9, 2019 under the theme “Good governance and sustainability: student response to water and sanitation problems” with the participation of 63 students from 25 countries. As the movement’s supreme decision-making body and an opportunity to build the capacity of movement leaders, WA is the very moment when educational resources are used to take advantage of current global and local trends. The objectives of the meeting were (1) to integrate the human rights approach in the analysis and dynamic implementation of OMS and (2) to rethink the structures of the movement so that it responds effectively to challenges of the time. As usual, the mission offered a holistic formation anchored in Catholic social teaching and channeled by a rights-based approach with the ambition of rejuvenating the capacity for action of the members and the movement. The meeting started with a training session and ended with a Business session.

The training session aimed to bring participants to an in-depth analysis and reflections on the main global challenges of sustainability. During this session, the facilitators helped participants view the global context with a critical mindset, particularly with regard to the implementation of the SDGs. Three levels (country, region and world) were exposed to the participants’ analysis, which was based more on their own

experiences than on the official account. From this questioning of progress towards sustainability, the participants noted a clear gap between official rhetoric and social and political realities because biases are introduced into development policies by a lack of contextualization and relevance of the SDGs. . This awareness of global trends that influence local realities such as unemployment, conflict, inequality, rights violations, vulnerability and other issues has led to the need for a deep understanding of challenges as an appropriate means. to offer a lasting solution. These discussions were moderated by a group presentation, round tables, interactive games, short presentations by the facilitator.

By digging into the notions of SDG 6 “Water and sanitation” as rights and governance as a practice of leadership, the second level of the study session nourished the participants’ understanding of the theme not only through the formal presentation but also through the exhibition in key places around Lusaka. . This practice, a tradition in the movement, is an exercise to refine the skills of participants in observation, analysis and reporting. The added value of the whole training session was contextualized and encouraged by a conclusive presentation on the principles of social teaching in the church. These are the compass of action within the movement.

AM generally serves as the movement’s strategic laboratory where actions are evaluated and planned, structures are questioned and created and leaders are renewed. As the

movement ended a four-year cycle of action, the second part of the gathering served as an assessment space for the whole movement through its international and regional activities, its structures and methodologies. On the basis of a strategic plan developed in 2016, the results of the activities of the last four years, the results of the global consultation, the leadership of the movement and the means of action of the movement, the participants expressed their views and critics from which new proposals where they were conceived. Indeed, the AO was a time to reflect on the call of the church, through Pope Francis in the continuity of traditional Catholic social teaching, to be more active in society; a call to all young people to express their full potential and transform their community by fighting injustice and defending human rights. The context of the celebration of the centenary of MIEC Pax Romana gave a particular aspect to this AM.

At this very moment, the International Bureau, in collaboration with the regional coordinations, has deepened the process in which they are engaged to reshape the approach of the movement to reposition itself not only in the church but also in society and in its target communities. In the United Nations system, it works to strengthen its position as the vocal movement of the future Catholic elite, because the movement believes that it fully participates in the spiritual and intellectual development of its members in a socio-political, economic and geopolitical context. mutation.

International Youth Conference

Trieste, September 27 to 29, 2019

The XII edition of the World Youth Forum organized by the international center for juvenile culture was held this year at the University of Trieste (Italy) from September 27 to 29. This forum having seen the participation of more than a hundred young Academics focused on the theme “There is no more time to lose: Environment, Law, Geopolitics”. This forum aims to be a place of intellectual emulation on global issues with a particular interest in the contribution of young intellectuals.

The participants selected on the basis of the relevance of the articles proposed led sessions to present their paper and debate around the major questions scheduled for the exchanges.

MIEC President Pax Romana took part in this forum and animated the exchanges around an article entitled “Integral ecology for peace in West Africa”. In his presentation, the president insisted on the link existing between security, environmental and climatic issues in the Sahel. By relying on the context of the deployment of the Great Green Wall project and that of the G5 Sahel whose parallel operation without concrete coordination presents itself as a sieve for important questions.



“Mobilising the global youth movement #ForYouthRights”

Geneva, 5-7 November 2019

As an International Youth Movement and NGO, we joined like-minded organizations and Regional Youth Councils at the Office of the High Commission of Human Rights headquarters in Geneva, Switzerland, to discuss the best measures on how more youth-focused issues could be included in national and international policies and collaborate within the implementation and evaluation processes. The International Coordination Meeting for Youth Organization partnered with the European Youth Forum to host us at the OHCHR headquarters in Geneva.

In the course of the 3-day meeting dubbed “Mobilising the global youth movement #ForYouthRights” from 5-7 November 2019, we deliberated on various youth-related themes and how the existing situations can be improved to make the life of every youth better. Our focus is to ensure that the youth front at every level has the enthusiasm to mobilize themselves and work together for the common good of everyone and society. Our zeal for positive change and transformation is overwhelming and that is how we seek to define our future while making a conscious effort to leave no one behind.

Over the years, IMCS Pax Romana has set the course of championing youth development across the world through youth engagement, policies, activity implementation as well as evaluation in various phases. The Movement in its wisdom has commenced the process of reengineering the method of engagement with youth in their various countries. We seek to use the bottom-up approach in our advocacy work.

This approach is promising and it intends to leverage on the already existing human resources and structure that we have been able to garner over the years. Going forward, we need to come to terms with the fact that youth rights cannot be implemented or experienced in isolation. This is because the youth forms the core of every country in the world. Hence, it is imperative to work together with like-minded individuals and organizations as well as governments to promote youth rights locally, regionally and globally.

Moreover, one of the things we realized is that, through our day-to-day administration, we make use of the Right-Based Approach. During our session, we assessed how we work using the Right-Based Approach tool and we were able to identify that almost everything that we do has a direct inspiration from this approach. Every little action counts in the implementation of youth-focused policies at any level as led by any team.



Although the Regional Youth Platforms and the International Youth NGOs are doing their best in supporting the implementation of the 2030 UN Youth Strategy, there are still some gaps in the UN Human Right System that needs to be addressed. It is worth noting that priority on youth in the past has not been well documented in the policies that had been implemented in the name of youth development. Typically, when we observe the human rights hearings from the countries during the assessment of their reports, it is clear that youth and youth-led organizations, as well as the regional youth platforms, must team up to follow up with the Voluntary National Reviews. The Human Rights System and the UN offer the opportunity to admit these organizations and regional youth platforms to come and observe while their countries' present the reports for reviews and assessment. An official procedure must be adhered to, such that, organizations could team up or represent independently during the sitting.

Youth is a process and it is a prerequisite that we all should get involved in developing the best out of it. Nothing about the youth without youth but the reality is different in our world today. The most important resource that is common in all countries is the vibrant and unique youth, however, these youths are underrated when it comes to what is really their worth. The value each youth is equated to is less than what they deserve and this is evident is the fact that most of these countries' development policies about either few or no mentions of their youth. We can do better.



Meeting with CCFD

Paris, November 15, 2019

As the Movement's main financial partner, the CCFD terre solidaire organized a seminar for the Catholic International Organizations it supports. This seminar aimed at strengthening the partnership with the CCFD was attended by 6 Catholic action organizations.

In order to introduce the meeting, the president Sylvie Bukhari de Pontual shared with the representatives of the organizations present, the current political, environmental and social issues considered as a link between the CCFD and these organizations.

This opened up times for sharing experiences, priorities, challenges, representation in the world and main projections for the future. MIEC, represented by its Secretary General and its International President, was also presented with the challenges that characterize it.

It should be noted that the meeting also gave rise to extensive reflections on the possibilities of improving the interventions operated by the movements represented, in all the geographic areas where they are present.

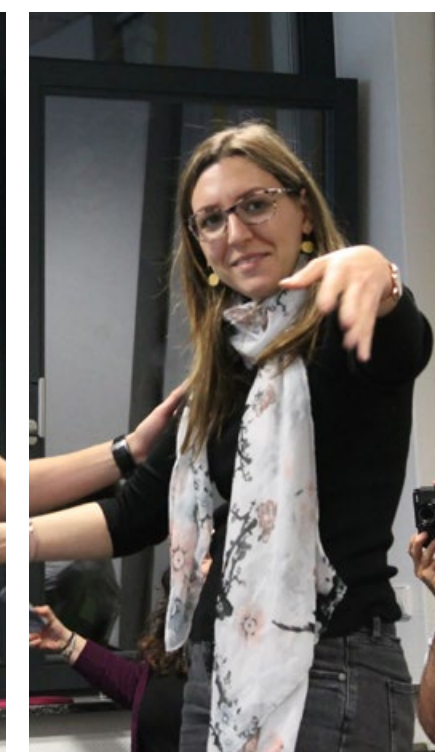
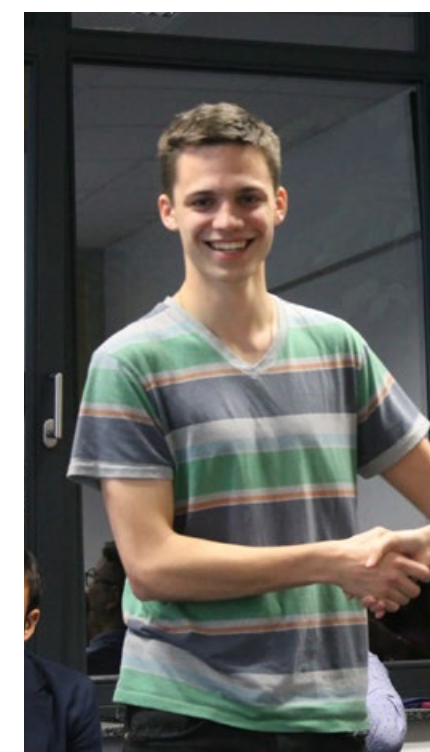
After years of leadership crisis, the European coordination of MIEC and JECI organized a structuring meeting in Cologne from November 22 to 24, 2019.

The MIEC participated in the discussions through its international president who brought the experience of the movement in the reduction of inequality with the youth targets. It was also an opportunity to forge partnerships for initiatives that meet shared objectives.



Paris Peace Forum

Paris, 11 to 13 November 2019

Berlin, 9 to 15 December 2019

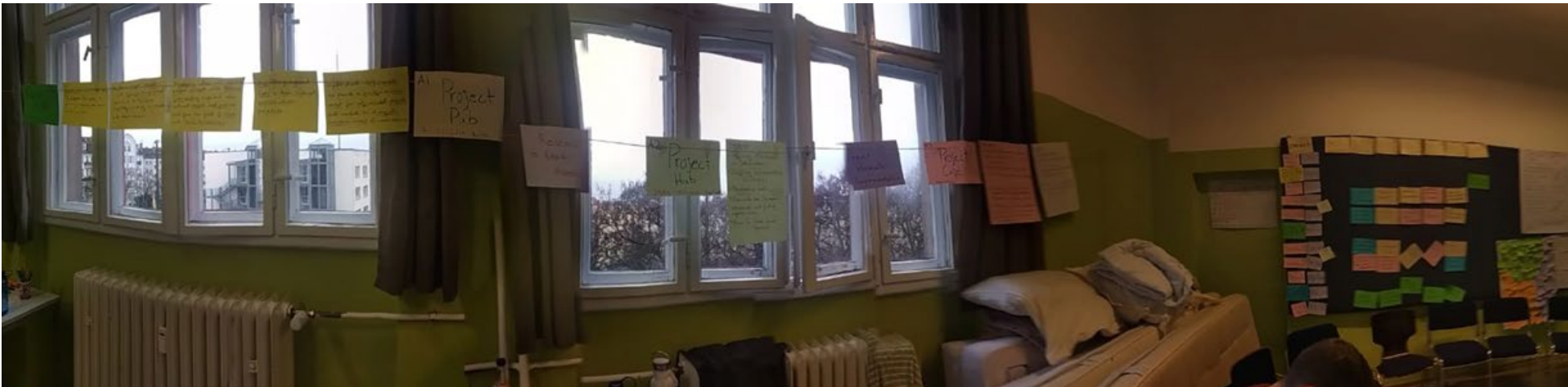
The Project Pub was organised by Service Civil International Germany and it was the first out of three seminars on Project Management with the focus on Networking and Inspiration.

Through a broad variety of non-formal education methods, the seminar provided a platform to share most proven ways and methods of Project Management. The aim of this activity was to enable participants to get inspiration from different countries, share their best practices, approaches, tools and methodologies to create a nature of better understanding on how to overcome obstacles in the management of projects.

Some of the outcomes of the session were for the participants to improve the following competences:

- Basic Project Knowledge and Tools
- How to run and evaluate need assessments
- Different (legal and corporate) approaches how to sustainably implement projects
- Developing ideas into project concepts
- Identifying adequate sources of funding

In the Project Pub took part 30 people from 16 European countries who got support to develop their ideas and realize their own projects to be implemented in their local community. IMCS took part in it with its Secretary General, Evelina Manola.



MESSAGE OF THE OUTGOING INTERNATIONAL TEAM

Dear members of the IMCS Pax Romana world family. We are coming to the end of the mission that you entrusted to us 4 years ago. Indeed during the World Assembly in the Philippines in 2015, the destiny of the movement at the global level was left to the care of our team. Our mission was to consolidate the movement's achievements and create new opportunities for members, both individually and for the movement as a whole. The aim was to be able to mark the presence of the movement in its time and leave a positive impact on the sectors that meet its foundations.

We have been doing this for the past 4 years by offering, in continuity with our predecessors, new opportunities for training, participation and advocacy. All the members of the movement have, in a way, has been expected to be contributors or beneficiaries on several initiatives proposed at the global level. The responses received, although sometimes not decisive, the results obtained as well as the failures from which we have learned, have demonstrated the vitality of our movement. We choose to give thanks for all that has been achieved with the help of leaders and active members from all over the world. Above all, we have realized the great potential that this movement has and the expectations that it receives.

It was particularly evident to us that the spirituality of our movement offers a specific response that is unique in a world of varied challenges. Humanity is threatened by discrimination, conflicts of identity and interest, the war of hegemony of liberal ideologies from which flow disguise imaginations. Youth is particularly targeted for its relative malleability and it seems to us that in our time, there is no initiative called spiritual, and not considering the critical and intellectual side, which is worthwhile for our generation.

Fortunately our movement from its foundation has given itself the mission of a holistic restoration of disadvantaged people and victims of injustices of all kinds; a mission whose active phase combines faith and intellect. For all members of the movement, it is a fundamental heritage to protect, deepen, adapt and bear fruit. There is faith for a future of justice and peace only if, while questioning the existing social and cultural policy, Christians are vigorously involved in the positive transformations of communities, whether they are directly part of it or not. This has always been the meaning of our movement, which ultimately wants to be a mold from which leaders would emerge for a world that would take away Christ.

Through this message, at the dawn of the celebration of our centenary, we would like to invite all of us to meditate on the mission of our movement and how our student status (law? Social sciences? Medical sciences? ICT? Etc.) contributes to (and / or draws from) this shared mission. We are both objects and subjects of our mission and the impact that we all expect can only be a reality if we all put ourselves in it as one family. IMCS Pax Romana is a project carried by all national movements worldwide and its implementation is the responsibility of each member individually. It is only at this price that the virtues of this movement will become more tangible to produce fruits from which all members, and society by extension, will benefit.

We are leaving the International Office full of confidence in your support for the new dynamic team elected this year, because we know that we all share the same conviction and the same mission which are reflected in the words of one of our elder founders of our movement, Pier Giorgio Frassatti "To live without faith, without a heritage to defend, without battling constantly for truth, is not to live but to 'get along'; we must never just 'get along'." (Letter to I. Bonini, 27.II.1925).

We thank all our close collaborators, advisers and all those who have never hesitated to support our various efforts.
